Overview & Current Events

Aegon NV is a financial holding company based in the Netherlands. The company provides a wide range of financial services to clients, including insurance, pensions, and asset management. Aegon has five core operating segments: Americas, Europe, Asia, Asset Management Holding and Other Activities. The firm's most widely-recognized brand is Transamerica, which Aegon acquired in 1999. United States investors can initiate a position in Aegon through American Depositary Receipts that trade on the New York Stock Exchange under the ticker AEG with a market cap of \$10.2 billion.

In mid-August, Aegon reported (8/12/21) financial results for the second quarter of fiscal 2021. Its operating income grew 62% over last year's quarter, primarily thanks to higher equity markets in the U.S., which greatly increased the fees received from clients, and material cost savings. The company has managed to reduce its expense base by €220 million and thus it has delivered more than half of its 2023 target of €400 million expense savings.

Like other life insurers, Aegon is hurt by the pandemic. If social distancing is not implemented, high mortality rates hurt the company. If social distancing is implemented, equity markets collapse and thus the value of the investments of Aegon and its fees slump. Management cut the annual dividend by -79% in 2020, from \$0.33 to \$0.07. However, Aegon is recovering strongly this year thanks to the containment of the pandemic and the resultant rally of the stock market.

Aegon has a poor performance record, as it has not generated consistent earnings growth over full economic cycles. In large part, this is due to a rising share count. Indeed, Aegon's share count has grown 41% over the last decade. This trend may continue, presenting a meaningful headwind to per-share growth. Due to the weak record and the improved results we expect this year, we expect only 4% earnings-per-share growth beyond this year.

Aegon declares a separate dividend each year depending on the firm's financial performance. The impact of this dividend policy can be seen in 2008-2010, when the company failed to declare dividends. Moreover, Aegon only pays its dividend twice per year, and its dividends are declared and paid in Euros (which introduces some foreign exchange risk). Accordingly, the firm is not an attractive security for investors looking to generate a consistent dividend income stream from their investment portfolios. The Netherlands imposes a dividend withholding tax of 15% on foreigners who choose to receive their dividends in cash but we have not included the effects of the dividend withholding tax in our analysis.

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Aegon's historical valuation has been volatile as its fundamental performance has fluctuated tremendously. The stock is currently trading at a low price-to-earnings ratio of 7.1. The cheap valuation has partly resulted from the suppressed interest rates in the U.S. and in Europe. Due to the volatile performance record of the company, we assume a fair value price-to-earnings ratio of 8.0 for Aegon. If the stock reaches a price-to-earnings ratio of 8.0 over the next five years, it will enjoy a 2.3% annualized gain in its returns.

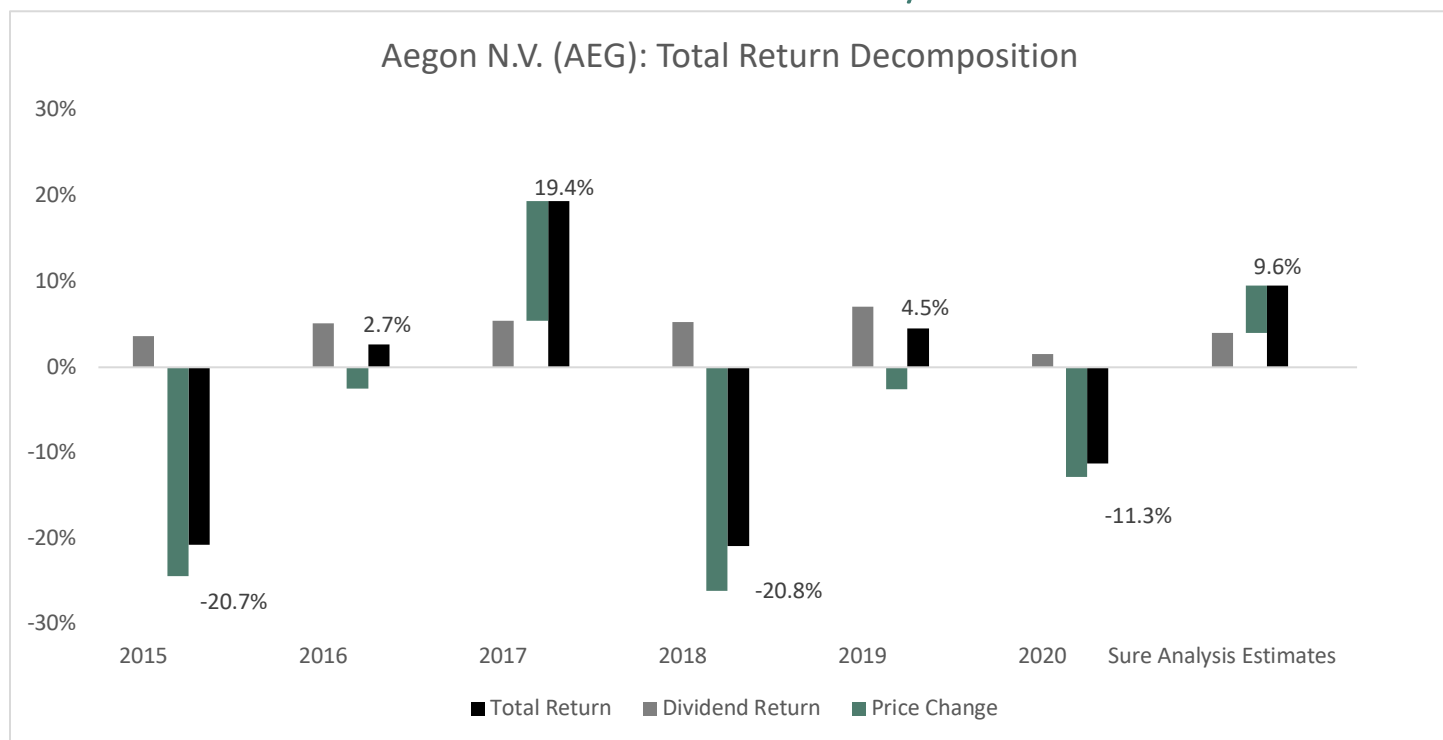

Aegon faces intense competition in its business and has a remarkably volatile performance record. It is thus evident that the company lacks a meaningful competitive advantage. The currency swings introduce additional volatility to the earnings and the dividends of the company for U.S. investors. Moreover, Aegon is vulnerable to the ongoing downturn, which has been caused by the pandemic. The recent dividend cut and the absence of dividends in 2009-2010 are harsh reminders of the vulnerability of Aegon to recessions.

Final Thoughts & Recommendation

Thanks to the enthusiasm of the market over the massive distribution of vaccines, Aegon has more than doubled in less than a year. As the pandemic has begun to subside, Aegon could still offer a 9.6% average annual return over the next five years. However, Aegon has a markedly volatile performance record and its stock price is much more volatile than the broad market. The stock earns a hold rating for risk aware investors, who can stomach wild stock price swings. The steep rally of the stock is a clear signal of the upside potential in the event of a strong global recovery from the pandemic, but it also reflects the vulnerability of Aegon to downturns.
