Overview & Current Events

Louisiana-Pacific Corp is a leading provider of engineered wood building materials, specializing in siding, structural panels, and oriented strand board (OSB). The company serves the construction, remodeling, and industrial markets, offering high-performance solutions designed for durability, efficiency, and sustainability. It operates 23 manufacturing facilities across North and South America, supplying durable, sustainable materials designed to meet the needs of builders and remodelers. LPX generated \$2.71 billion in sales last year. It trades with a market cap of \$5.25 billion.

On May 6th, 2026, Louisiana-Pacific released its Q1 results for the period ending March 31st, 2026. Net sales declined 21% year-over-year to \$574 million. Siding sales decreased by 10% to \$360 million, as a 9% increase in average selling prices was more than offset by 18% lower volumes, while OSB revenue fell 37% to \$168 million due to lower prices and volumes. Adjusted EBITDA fell 49% to \$82 million, reflecting an \$80 million year-over-year decrease primarily attributable to lower OSB pricing and volumes, as well as lower Siding volumes. The company reported net income of \$27 million, or \$0.39 per diluted share, for the quarter, while adjusted diluted EPS was \$0.38. We have set our EPS power estimate at \$4.30. However, this year's adjusted EPS is likely to land close to \$2.00.

Louisiana-Pacific's EPS history over the past decade reflects the impact of industry cycles and the various operational transformations the company has experienced. Following weak OSB prices and a sluggish housing previously, recovery started to take place in 2016 with EPS growing to \$1.05 as OSB prices improved and operational efficiency efforts took hold. By 2017 and 2018, EPS grew to \$2.71 and \$2.79, supported by strong demand for siding and structural products amid a strengthening housing market.

In 2019, EPS turned negative again due to a downturn in OSB prices and the flat housing market, despite growth in high-margin siding sales. Fortunately for the company, the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 brought a housing boom powered by remodeling and homebuilding, driving EPS to \$4.48 as LPX capitalized on surging demand for its products. In 2021, EPS reached a peak of \$14.19, reflecting record OSB prices and strong execution in its specialty product segments. In 2022, its divestiture of non-core assets, such as its Engineered Wood Products division, supported its focus on higher-margin segments like siding and structural solutions. Still, as housing demand softened and OSB prices normalized, EPS declined to \$13.94 in 2022 and plunged to \$2.47 in 2023 as margins got under heavy pressure following declining sales. In 2024, EPS rebounded to \$5.89 on improved OSB pricing and resilient siding results, before declining to \$2.08 in 2025 as weaker OSB prices and volumes compressed margins.

Moving forward, we project a 7% annual EPS growth rate driven by demand for sustainable building materials, siding capacity expansion, and growth in repair and remodeling, alongside continued share buybacks. Still, we warn that our

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estimates are speculative due to the unpredictable nature of commodity prices on top of uncertainty in the residential real estate market. We have applied the same growth rate to the dividend, which LPX has raised for 9 consecutive years.

Louisiana-Pacific's P/E ratio has swung notably over the years, due to wild shifts in its earnings and investor sentiment. In 2016, the P/E of 16.7 highlighted market optimism as EPS rebounded after losses in prior years. By 2017 and 2018, LPX's P/E multiple compressed to 8.5 and 9.7, respectively, due to temporarily strong earnings growth from siding and structural solutions. Multiples fell in the single-digits during the pandemic due to one-off earnings jumps as a result of unprecedentedly favorable market conditions. Today the stock is trading at 17.5x our EPS power, which implies the stock is slightly undervalued. Still, there is a risk regarding whether EPS actually rebounds to our "earnings power" levels soon.

Safety, Quality, Competitive Advantage, & Recession Resiliency

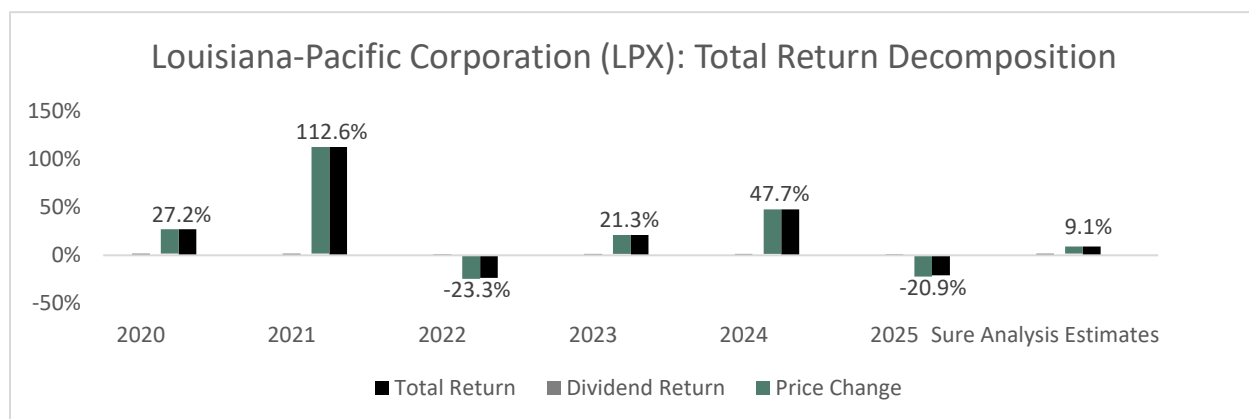

Louisiana-Pacific benefits from its focus on high-margin, value-added building products and its operational efficiency and mill conversions in recent years that align production with demand for specialty products. These products offer higher profitability and lower exposure to commodity price volatility compared to traditional OSB products. Still, the building materials industry is highly competitive, with LPX facing challenges from larger, vertically integrated players that benefit from economies of scale and smaller regional manufacturers with niche market focus. Moreover, the industry's inherent susceptibility to market downturns poses risks, as housing and remodeling demand fluctuate with economic conditions. During recessions, reduced construction activity and declining commodity prices can pressure earnings. Earnings turned negative during the Great Financial Crisis and any other period tough conditions in the housing market, despite earnings surging during the COVID-19 pandemic as a result of exceptionally favorable market conditions.

Final Thoughts & Recommendation

Louisiana-Pacific's focus on high-margin specialty products and the growing repair and remodeling market could position it for growth. Still, its earnings outlook is highly speculative and can fluctuate either way based on the underlying market conditions. In any case, we forecast annualized returns 9.1% over the medium-term mainly powered from EPS growth, the dividend, and a valuation tailwind. LPX earns a buy rating, though we note there are risks attached to the name.
